SOLDIERS AMBUSHED IN AFGHANISTAN REMEMBERED

On a tragic October day in Afghanistan, 64 soldiers of Bravo Troop, 3-61 Cavalry were ambushed on their remote combat outpost, COP Keating. During heavy fighting, they were forced to call an air strike on their own position during the October 3 attack by Taliban militants. After the battle, eight U.S. soldiers lay dead, 24 were wounded, and the 56 survivors were left with nothing more than the clothes on their backs and their weapons. They were relocated to safety at another base.

Soon after the attack, one of the soldiers e-mailed The American Legion, concerned that no one at home knew what they were doing in Afghanistan, and that no one really cared. The soldier's email was posted on The Burn Pit (a website and blog maintained by Legionnaires), the Legion's COP Keating Relief Fund was created, and a cry went out to help the survivors.

OTA was one of many groups that answered a plea to help. Within hours, OTA had sent replacement clothing, cold weather boot socks and other items to help these soldiers return to a sense a normalcy as quickly as possible.

These soldiers will never forget the day they lost eight of their brothers, and Americans will never forget the sacrifices all of our uniformed men and women make everyday. As a testament to the Legion's efforts, more than \$100,000 in funds and supplies were donated from various groups like OTA, as well as major US companies, to reach out to the soldiers who endured so much in this battle.

In a touching end to the story, the Command Sergeant Major (the highest ranking enlisted soldier of the 3-61 Cavalry battalion), sent this note to OTA.

In lieu of sending gifts to tenants who occupy the flagship US Steel building they manage in downtown Pittsburgh, Winthrop Management decided to adopt 13 troop units in Iraq and Afghanistan with a \$5,207 donation. 1/110TH PA NATIONAL GUARD DEPLOYS TO AFGHANISTAN

On January 6th, 230 members of the PA National Guard left Pittsburgh to complete their final leg of training before deploying to Afghanistan.

These soldiers will be attached to the 178th Field Artillery National Guard from South Carolina. This five-company battalion will be doing force security in Afghanistan.

Two of these five companies are from Pittsburgh (C Company and D Company, 110th Infantry). Both units are comprised of soldiers from the 107th Field Artillery and the 110th Infantry. These soldiers will be deployed and based on two Forward Operating Bases (FOBs) in Afghanistan.



Training is expected to be complete in early February, at which time they will begin their deployment to Afghanistan.

Some of the men being deployed have been an integral part of OTA, volunteering countless hours to help support us logistically. We are very proud of them all and wish them success as they carry out their mission. They continue the proud heritage of the PA National Guard and we are honored to be able to help them. Please keep them in your thoughts and prayers.

Many of the items we provide our troops are expensive (e.g., safety and tactical gear), so we have a great need for financial contributions.


Runners had an opportunity to win competition prizes, and everyone went home with goody bags filled with fun treats.

Now that is a prize we can all treasure.




On Sunday, November 8th, nearly 300 runners and walkers gathered in the Hampton Community Park to take advantage of the unusually warm temperatures and sunny sky.
