With 150,000 soldiers who will be away from their families this year, OTA was intent on making the holidays a little brighter for our troops. Asked by several units to help them put on Christmas programs for their lonely and homesick troops, OTA got to work!

In Their Own Words....

We'd like to share with you a very touching email we received from a chaplain working with one of the units OTA supported this Christmas. As much as Americans appreciate our troops and their sacrifices, it's heartening to know many Iraqis do, too. Chaplain Dwight Dunlap of the 61st Multifunctional Medical Battalion says it all, in his own words...

"Let me tell you about a person I just met just this past week. This person is a true hero of Iraq, and the ongoing war, who has a story that you will NEVER hear on any media outlet in the States.

I met her Monday evening when my assistant and I accompanied a group of soldiers and airmen to visit the hospital here on Anaconda. This woman is an Iraqi who is an interpreter for the coalition forces. She accompanied us to the hospital because many of the patients at the hospital are Iraqi citizens. Average "Joe" Iraqi citizens are often the targets of insurgents, who do not discriminate among age or sex. Besides being an interpreter, which makes this woman a high profile target, she is a Christian as well. She is originally from Baghdad, where she became an immediate target of the insurgents because of her assistance to the Coalition forces.

Her picture and a picture of one of her closest friends were posted on the walls of Mosques all throughout Baghdad. Just days after the postings, her friend was killed, not because she was not an interpreter, but only because of her association with one. This women's house was then attacked by insurgents, killing one of her sons, and injuring her other son.

Now this women and her surviving son live in "exile" up here, and the rest of her family live in hiding as well in other parts of the country. Despite all of this, she continues to assist American forces as an interpreter. Her resolve is not shaken.

I bluntly asked her why she continues to aid coalition forces after all she experienced. Surely no one would blame her if she decided to call it quits. She replied that the American soldiers have sacrificed so much to help out her country, how could she refuse? That I myself and all the soldiers have left behind their families and have come over to Iraq to make her country free.

Her resolve and dedication were astounding and most humbling. I just thought I would share this story with all of you. I only wish you could have heard it from her own mouth."

Postscript: A church in the U.S. has raised money to bring this woman and her entire family to live in the States eventually.

Welcome Home 463rd Combat Engineers!

On Friday, December 2, the headquarters company (HHC) of the 463rd Combat Engineer battalion came home to Wheeling, WV after an 18-month deployment. OTA was present to welcome back these soldiers as they were reunited with their families for the first time in over a year.

Earlier in the spring, OTA sent a rock and roll band full of instruments to the 463rd, including acoustic, base and electric guitars, drums, keyboard and sound and mixing equipment. The unit enjoyed playing and listening to soldier musicians at concerts and church services.

Before returning to the U.S., the 463rd gave these instruments to their replacements so they too could enjoy the gift of music while deployed.

In appreciation for support shown to the 463rd while deployed, Lieutenant Colonel Hackett presented OTA with two appreciation plaques and a Commendation Coin.
